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Introduction - Bible Study Series: Nehemiah

The book of Nehemiah is a powerful account of God's faithfulness, the perseverance of His people, and the restoration of both walls and worship. Set in the fifth century BC, Nehemiah follows the return of the Jewish people from Babylonian exile and the rebuilding of Jerusalem's broken walls. But this book is about much more than construction—it is about the spiritual renewal of God's people, courageous leadership, persistent prayer, and deep dependence on God.

Nehemiah served as the cupbearer to King Artaxerxes of Persia, a trusted role in the royal court. When Nehemiah heard that Jerusalem was in ruins, his heart broke. His grief turned to prayer, and his prayer led to action. God opened doors for Nehemiah to return to Jerusalem to lead the rebuilding effort. The task was monumental and met with fierce opposition, but Nehemiah demonstrates that when God is for His people, no enemy can ultimately prevail.

The book divides neatly into two main parts. Chapters 1–7 focus on the rebuilding of the city walls. Nehemiah leads with wisdom, courage, and faith. He faces mockery, threats, discouragement, and even betrayal, but the people complete the work in just 52 days because "the gracious hand of God" was upon them (Nehemiah 2:8).

Chapters 8–13 shift the focus to the spiritual rebuilding of the people. Under the leadership of Ezra and Nehemiah, the people rediscover God's Word, confess their sins, and recommit to living as His covenant people. The revival that breaks out is not based on emotional hype but on hearing and understanding God's Word (Nehemiah 8:8). Their worship is heartfelt, their repentance is genuine, and their obedience is practical.

Nehemiah teaches us vital lessons about leadership, prayer, perseverance, holiness, and trusting God through opposition. It also shows us God's heart to restore His people and His purposes. The rebuilding of Jerusalem ultimately points us forward to Jesus Christ, who is building His church and whose finished work on the cross restores what is broken.

As you study Nehemiah, look for God's sovereign hand in every chapter. Watch how He raises up leaders, strengthens His people, and accomplishes His purposes against all odds. Let Nehemiah's commitment to prayer, the Word, and God's glory challenge and inspire you to be part of the rebuilding work God is doing in your own life and in His church today.







Introduction Question:

Read Nehemiah 7

 After the wall is completed, what is Nehemiah's next priority? (vv.1-3)

3. Who does Nehemiah appoint as leaders and why? (v.2)

Closing Challenge:

God's Word is life-giving, joy-giving, and community-shaping. Nehemiah 8 reminds us to seek understanding, to respond with joy, and to rediscover the treasures of God's truth together. Will you prioritise hearing, understanding, and rejoicing in God's Word this week?

9. Nehemiah 9 | Sun 21 Sept

Title: Confession and Covenant: God's Faithfulness Through History

Introduction Question:

When you look back over your life or family history, do you see patterns of God's kindness—even when people failed? How does this shape your view of God?

Read Nehemiah 9 Comprehension Questions:

1. How do the people physically express their repentance and humility before God? (vv.1-3)

2. What do the Levites lead the people to do throughout this chapter? (vv.4-6)

3. How does the prayer retell Israel's history? What are some key events mentioned? (vv.7-31)

4.	What patterns of God's character are highlighted in this prayer? (vv.17-21, 27-31)
5.	How does the prayer finish? What do the people commit to in response? (vv.32-38)

Nehemiah 9 shows us that God's story is one of repeated rescue despite our repeated failures. He is gracious, compassionate, slow to anger, and abounding in love. Will you trust His mercy, confess your sin, and cling to His faithful promises today?

10. Nehemiah 10 | Sun 28 Sept

Introduction Question:

Have you ever made a commitment or promise that really shaped how you lived? What helped you stick to it?

Read Nehemiah 10

Comprehension Questions:

- 1. Who enters into the binding agreement in this chapter? (9:38, 10:28-29)
- 2. What are the main promises the people make to God in this covenant? (vv.30-39)

3. Why do they make a specific promise not to intermarry with surrounding nations? (v.30)

4. What is their commitment regarding the Sabbath? (v.31)

6. What is the atmosphere of the celebration, and what does it say about the people's relationship with God? (12:43)

Title: Finishing Well: Ongoing Reform and Faithfulness Introduction Question:

Have you ever returned to something after a long time and found that people or situations had changed in ways you didn't expect? How did you respond?

Read Nehemiah 13 Comprehension Questions:

1. What problems does Nehemiah discover when he returns to Jerusalem? (vv.4-9)

2. How does Nehemiah respond to the misuse of the temple? (vv.7-9)

3. What issue does Nehemiah confront regarding the Levites and temple worship? (vv.10-14)

4. What does Nehemiah do about Sabbath-breaking? (vv.15-22)
5. How does Nehemiah address the issue of intermarriage and cultural compromise? (vv.23-31)
6. How does Nehemiah's prayer ("Remember me with favour, my God") frame his actions throughout this chapter? (vv.14, 22, 31)

10	. What can we learn from Nehemiah's passionate, sometimes aggressive leadership? How do we balance zeal and grace when
	correcting problems in our churches today?

Biblical Theology Questions:

11. Nehemiah tries to reform God's people but knows their hearts continue to wander. How does this prepare us for the greater, lasting heart change that only Jesus brings? (See Ezekiel 36:25-27; Ephesians 2:1-10, Hebrews 10:14-18)

12. Nehemiah's final prayer is for God to "remember me." How does Jesus' perfect life and sacrificial death guarantee that God will remember and accept us forever? (See Luke 23:42-43; Hebrews 9:24)

Additional Bible Passages to Consider:

- Ezekiel 36:25-27 God promises new hearts.
- 1 Corinthians 16:13-14 Be watchful, stand firm, do everything in love.
- Galatians 6:9 Do not grow weary in doing good.
- Luke 23:42-43 Jesus welcomes the repentant thief into paradise.
